I attended the U3A Eastern Region 'Gathering' at the Science Park in Cambridge recently. Just to clarify, the U3A has a National Executive made up of regional representatives. Within the 12 regions there are local networks or clusters of U3As that do things together. In our case, the local network is called the Beds Plus Forum covering Bedford, Milton Keynes, Buckingham, Luton, Linslade/Leighton Buzzard and others.

The purpose of the meeting in Cambridge was to have a first look at the regional implications of the national strategy, 'Going Forward 2014–2016' which was launched at the national AGM in September. A copy can be made available to you upon request. The Vision, Mission and Principles of the U3A are shown on page 18. I was surprised and very pleased to find that the Eastern Region of the U3A has a strong team of Regional Volunteers. Our local network and the MKU3A do not make any contribution to the regional volunteers or make use of the facility. Food for thought!

Your ideas on getting the questions right would be most welcome. It is the intention to publish the results of the survey to all members in summary form.

A two and a half hour tour of the Mini car plant. Oxford is the birthplace and heart of Mini production. Manufactured to individual customer specifications, hundreds of Minis leave the plant's assembly lines each day, off to meet new owners in 108 countries around the world. Three UK plants have had a part to play in Mini production: Hams Hall Plant makes engines. The Swindon plant produces body pressings and sub-assemblies. This all comes together at the Oxford plant with body shell production, paint and final assembly.

Do you know how many plays Shakespeare wrote? Did he write them at all? From where did his amazing knowledge of human nature emerge? What about the sonnets, all one hundred and fifty-four of them? What was his target audience? How on earth did he fit so much into his adult life of around 25 years? How did he get to know about the Elizabethan court? What did he and his friends eat, wear and sit on?

Interested?

The aim of our new group is to broaden our knowledge of Shakespeare through the plays and poems and what we know of his life. We are also interested in a wider exploration of what it was like to live in the late 16th and early 17th centuries. This was a period of great change and growth for England. At 25 years old, Elizabeth took over an ailing and poverty-ridden nation. In her forty-five years on the throne, the country was transformed until it was considered to be one of the most peaceful and prosperous reigns in history. It was also a time of plots and conspiracies and we plan to look at both the personal and the political in Shakespeare's work.

We are full of ideas and enthusiasm and hope to spend time on some or all of the following: Play reading, play watching, talking about the plays and their characters, delight in the language (including working out what the words are actually saying), the clothes, architecture, travel, social customs, politics of the time, food and drink (no tea!) and Shakespeare's contemporaries, group visits to theatre/cinema and music. These are the ideas we have come up with initially. You don't have to be well acquainted with the plays already. We are all hoping to increase our knowledge, love and enjoyment of his work, whatever our starting points.

- **11 December 2014** *From Signals to Perception: The Science of the Senses* by Dr Ellie Dommett of The Open University. Have you ever wondered how we really perceive the world around us and interact with it successfully? This lecture will describe how our sensory systems enable us to perceive our environment using information from sensory stimuli, cues and expectations.
- **18 December 2014** *Molecules and Murder* by Prof John Nicholson of St Mary's University. This lecture covers the subject of chemistry poisons and also the use of poisons by criminals. It begins by considering the general topic of poisons, including their most frequent mode of action. It goes on to to consider specific poisons, and cases in which they appeared, and also how the murderer was brought to justice.
- **8 January 2015** Nanotechnology for Delivering Therapeutic Agents Into the Brain by Prof David Male of The Open University. More than 95% of the drugs that could potentially be used for treating neurological disorders and brain tumours do not pass from the blood into the brain. A physiological system that protects the brain from foreign or toxic molecules prevents their transport.
- **15 January 2015** *The STEM of Music* by Dr Paul Ganney of University College, London. "I don't know anything about music. In my line, you don't have to." Elvis Presley! Music is art and not science. Sort of. Well, not at all, really. It's really set theory. Boyle's Law, Fleming's Rule, Fourier transforms, hot electrons; and it almost got ruined completely by Pythagoras.

This was followed by his ovation guitar, which he referred to as his work horse and he sang a song about a little girl of six who lived next door when he was four, all very sweet. *Leaving On A Jet Plane* was played on his tenor guitar and we all had a go at singing along with this one.

We joined him in memories from his teenage years, from the time he discovered alcohol through to when in started going to Folk Clubs. At a folk club at the Dun Cow public house in Daventry, he met Jake Thackray who asked him to sing.

In 1983 he caught the eye of a pretty young waitress at a Barn Dance. Much to his surprise she agreed to visit him in Rugby and 31 years later she is his wife, shopping in Milton Keynes while he is singing to us! Their courtship suffered times of separation when he wrote "Wish You Were With Me Tonight" - another song he included in his repertoire for us. He concluded the afternoon where he began, with a song for babies, this one was a lullaby written for his two children. We didn't know the words but we joined him in singing lots of La La La La's......

Open Meeting 22 October - Unmasking the Cock Lane Ghost



At the Open Meeting in October, we listened eagerly as Ian Keable unfolded the tale of the Cock Lane Ghost. A true story of a haunting that attracted mass public attention in 1762. The location was an apartment in Cock Lane, a short road adjacent to Smithfield market. The event centred on three people: William Kent, a usurer from Norfolk; Richard Parsons, a parish clerk, and the daughter of Richard Parsons called Elizabeth.

Following the death during childbirth of William Kent's wife, he became romantically involved with her sister, Fanny. In those days, the law prevented the couple from marrying as they were brother and sister in-law, but they nevertheless moved to London and lodged at the property in Cock Lane, owned by Parsons. Several accounts of strange knocking sounds and ghostly apparitions were reported, although for the most part they stopped after the couple moved out, but following Fanny's death from smallpox and William Kent's successful legal action against Richard Parsons over an outstanding debt, they resumed. Parsons claimed that Fanny's ghost haunted his property. Regular séances were held to determine the motives of 'Scratching Fanny' and Cock Lane was often made impassable by the throngs of interested bystanders.

The ghost appeared to claim that Fanny had been poisoned with arsenic and Kent was publicly suspected of being her murderer. But a commission whose members included Samuel Johnson concluded that the supposed haunting was a fraud. Further investigations proved the scam was perpetrated by Elizabeth Parsons, under duress from her father. Those responsible were prosecuted and found guilty. Richard Parsons was pilloried and sentenced to two years in prison. Even after leaving prison he protested his innocence.

Charles Dickens is one of several Victorian authors whose work alluded to the story and the pictorial satirist William Hogarth referenced the ghost in two of his prints – which Ian included in his presentation alongside his talk. Quite intriguing!

All places are on a first come first served basis and are restricted to 12 people. If insufficient members are interested we will cancel some or all of the blocks. The Principles of the U3A Movement

The U3A Movement is non-religious and non-political and has three main principles:

The Third Age Principle

- * Membership of a U3A is open to all in the third age, which is defined not by a particular age but by a period in life in which full-time employment has ceased.
- * Members promote the values of lifelong learning and the positive attributes of belonging to a U3A.
- * Members should do all they can to ensure that people wanting to join a U3A can do so.

The Self-help Learning Principle

- * Members form interest groups covering as wide a range of topics and activities as they desire; by the members, for the members.
- * No qualifications are sought or offered. Learning is for its own sake, with enjoyment being the prime motive, not qualifications or awards.
- * There is no distinction between the learners and the teachers; they are all U3A members.

The Mutual Aid Principle

- * Each U3A is a mutual aid organisation, operationally independent but a member of the Third Age Trust, which requires adherence to the guiding principles of the U3A movement.
- * No payments are made to members for services rendered to any U3A.
- * Each U3A is self-funded with membership subscriptions and costs kept as low as possible.
- * Outside financial assistance should only be sought if it does not imperil the integrity of the U3A movement.
