Beginners' Modern Sequence Dancing

(Includes Ballroom & Latin technique)

This proposed new Group will be held at the Cross and Stable Community Centre, Downs Barn, on Thursday afternoons from 1.45pm to 3.45 pm – with essential tea break of course.

It is designed for Members with little or no experience of Ballroom Dancing, although social dancers who would like to learn the popular Sequence Dances would find it useful.

The syllabus will include most of the traditional sequence dances plus some recently invented dances that are becoming popular.

Some time will be spent on figures from Ballroom and Latin that appear frequently in Sequence and need to be learned following the official rules on alignment, footwork and technique.

Sequence is 'together' dancing and Members without a partner need to be



prepared to dance Leader or Follower.

The group will be taught by a professional dance teacher, an active member of two Societies approved by the BDC and qualified in Ballroom, Latin and Old Time Dancing.

Modern Sequence Dance Proposal

A little more in depth about this proposal.

This is envisaged as a pleasant Thursday afternoon Tea Dance, initially, with a large element of instruction, later on a mixture of instruction and practice.

Modern Sequence Dancing is a branch of Ballroom Dancing. It includes all Modern, Latin and Old Time Rhythms in a very disciplined format. Each element must conform to the rules laid down by the British Dance Council and all dances taught by professional teachers must be authorised by the same authority.

For example: The Waltz, Foxtrot, Quickstep and Modern Tango must be danced in closed hold – partners must not separate at any time. Latin dances, ie Rumba, Cha Cha, Samba, Mambo, Jive and Salsa, must use the correct footwork etc. A big advantage of this is that, having learned Sequence Dancing, you will have a great repertoire of dance variations that are also appropriate at a Ballroom dance.

The real advantage of Sequence Dancing is that all the dancers must execute the same pattern of dance steps at the same time. This means (hopefully) that all dancers are moving round the floor in the same direction thus avoiding the chaos that can exist at a crowded Ballroom Dance.

There are really two categories of Sequence Dancers. New Sequence Routines are invented every year, they are the winning routines from the various Associations awarding qualifications to Dance Teachers and other approved organisations.

Usually about 40 are released each year in all the different rhythms. These are taught after their release, and many Clubs and classes teach them all and plan dance programmes of new dances with usually one or two old favourites.

Other clubs dance a programme of very old dances, the same ones each week, plus a few of the easier newly invented dances usually with a few Ballroom Dances thrown in! At the more advanced dances it is usual for the teachers to 'lead the floor', dancing through one or two routines to remind the dancers of the steps.

We propose to teach a selection of older dances and new dances as the class progresses. We like to make our Tea Dances fun, and a sociable event for the participants. There will be tea and biscuits of course. We try to keep our music lively and varied!

The wider world of Sequence Dancing can provide wonderful experiences and the chance to make new friends. There is an amazing choice of Sequence Holidays at both levels all around the country and also in fairly exotic places abroad – usually run by Sequence Professionals.

It is always possible to attend inventive dance competitions around the country and learn the winning dances from the professionals who invented them, and when you visit other parts of the country, perhaps on holiday, you are always very welcome at local dances.

Finally, remember that dancing can seriously improve your health, keeping the mind active and the body exercised is the best way to keep healthy in both.

Writing Yourself - adventure into creative writing by Kathy Mansfield

The programme will consist of eight sessions during May and June 2019. The plan is that each session will be approximately 2 hours long and that each will be stimulating and fun!

The Aim of the Programme is to provide a safe space for those new, or not so new, to creative writing, to generate pieces of writing in the sessions.

I will use different methods of inspiration to encourage the creative juices and we will use a gentle technique to critique and help each other to consider the work produced.

We will use a workshop approach to encourage writing and sharing - always asking the essential questions: what is my piece of writing trying to do and how does it do it?

Some of the technical areas we will cover include:

- The essentials of a good story what are these?
- Inspirations what can you use? what do you use?
- 1st person/3rd person whose voice?
- Dialogue how do your characters speak? How does speech move the story along? Do they sound authentic?
- The plot what keeps a reader turning the page?

What do you need to bring? It is an entirely personal choice. Some people (me

included) can only write using a pen and notebook. Others use a laptop. Bring whatever makes you feel the most comfortable.

<u>26 June – Dogs for Good</u> – name of speaker to be confirmed

This month we will gain an insight into the fascinating work of the charity *Dogs for Good*.

These dogs are trained to help people with disabilities to make their life easier, including:

- Opening and closing doors
- Helping with dressing and undressing
- Retrieving items such as mobile telephones or dropped articles like keys or a bag
- Loading and emptying the washing machine
- Pressing a pedestrian crossing button
- Reaching up to shop-counters with items such as a wallet

24 July – Photography as Art - Karen Thurmanovich

Karen will explore how movements in the photographic world mirrored movements in the art world in general, especially starting in the 1920s. This will be followed by a discussion about photography as art and the role that photographic art plays in social change.

<u>23 October – James Gillray: First Ever Political Cartoonist</u> - Ian Keable

Who doesn't love a spot of political satire? But did you know that James Gillray succeeded William Hogarth as the primary satirist of the 18th century, not only taking caricaturing to new heights but also refining the format of the cartoon to one that we are now familiar with? He is now generally accepted as the first, and the greatest, political cartoonist, still revered today by modern cartoonists.



27 November - Moments, Memories and Magic - Vic Bottrill


