

Food 4 Thought

The Food4Thought group meets on the third Wednesday of the month at Neath Hill.

Last month we learnt about Coeliac Disease, the effects it has on the body, and the lifestyle changes required to treat it, such as swapping to a gluten free diet.

Coeliac disease what is it? It is a long-term autoimmune disorder that primarily affects the small intestine. Classic symptoms include gastrointestinal problems such as chronic diarrhoea, abdominal distention, malabsorption, loss of appetite and among children failure to grow normally. This should not be confused with those suffering from a Gluten Allergy or Gluten Intolerance.



These do not cause harm to the body in any way but will make you feel unwell with sickness and diarrhoea until the gluten has left the system.

Coeliac disease is caused by a reaction to gluten, a group of various proteins found in wheat and other grains such as barley and rye). Moderate quantities of oats, free of contamination with other gluten-containing grains, can usually be tolerated.

What is Tissue Transglutaminase? It is one of several blood tests that may be used to help diagnose Coeliac Disease. Tissue Transglutaminase is an enzyme that fixes damage in your body. People with Coeliac Disease often make antibodies that attack this enzyme. These are called anti-tissue transglutaminase antibodies.

In the small bowel, this causes an inflammatory reaction and may produce shortening of the villi lining the small intestine (villous atrophy). This affects the absorption of nutrients, frequently leading to anaemia.

The only known effective treatment for those suffering from Coeliac disease is a strict lifelong gluten-free diet which in most people leads to recovery of the intestinal mucosa, and improves symptoms.

Living gluten-free means changing the way you shop, cook and eat out. It's important to eat a healthy balanced diet to provide all the energy and nutrients your body needs, it isn't always easy though, especially if you're new to the gluten-free diet. With gluten-free substitute products costing on average 3-4 times more than standard gluten containing equivalents, it can have an impact on your weekly shopping bill too.

The most obvious sources of gluten are bread all kinds/pasta/breakfast cereals/flour/pastry/pizza bases/cakes/biscuits/soups/sauces/ready meals and sausages. People with Coeliac Disease have to find

substitutes for these products and fortunately there is now a wide range of gluten-free food available in all the major supermarkets, and online GF sites, such as GF Foods Ltd, Amazon, Ocado, and GF kitchen.

This biographical talk about the life and music of Frank Sinatra follows his career from its earliest days until his death.




MK U3A - Making Changes to your Personal Details




The lecture topics have been chosen carefully so that they build on and extend elements of the GCSE and A Level programmes of study.
