Our Cooking Holiday in Tuscany



My wife and I have just enjoyed a wonderful holiday in Tuscany, Italy at La Mezzaluna. We purchased a cooking and wine tasting seven-day break.

The hospitality of our hosts was as good as, if not better, than we have ever experienced previously. From being collected at Pisa Airport for the three and a quarter drive north to Barga, to coffee, tea and wine always available, outings each day and four full cooking periods during our stay of about four hours each.

With good weather we were able to eat dinners outside each evening. Lunches were taken at restaurants with all costs included in the original fee paid. Our visits included trips to Pisa for the Leaning Tower and to Lucca, local medieval towns and hamlets as well as visits to a vineyard and a cheese making farm both of which provided exceptional lunches with wine.

The cooking tuition consisted of authentic-style Italian recipes which included making pasta dishes, creating

pizza's and sauces of our own as well significant fish dishes which included giant prawns, octopus, and squid as well as several different fishes.

All nine of us participants were fully involved in these sessions. The other participants were from the USA, Canada, Ireland, England and India yet we all got on like a house on fire. The atmosphere throughout our stay was brilliant.

The accommodation too was of a high standard and nothing was too much trouble for our hosts who were constantly available. They even arranged an Italian lesson for us on one afternoon.

The views across to the mountains were outstanding and the scenery as we travelled about was stunning.

My 600 plus photographs show just how much there was to see and record.

One evening after dinner we had a short karaoke session where I ventured to share my singing voice for the only time I ever have as an adult, and with some success.

My wife and I have executed some of the dishes we learnt using the recipes given to us during our stay with moderate success so far but we are determined to keep developing our skills of Italian cuisine. We would certainly enjoy this holiday all over again.

Play acting keeps our memory active and the social contact is wonderful. We have worked with other U3A groups in MK, especially photography, and thank the general membership for their support by coming to see us.

Wine Appreciation Group

Brian Hundy, who started this Group about 25 years ago, is standing down as Group Leader at the end of the year, handing over to Chris Forster.

We were one of the first U3As (if not the 1st) to have a wine group and now it is very common.

Over this period the Group has tasted about 1200 bottles of wine from 24 Countries made from at least 70 different grape varieties. When the Group started a reasonably good wine cost about £4 but now the equivalent would be, at least, £8-10.

Generally the Group samples everyday wines but have continued to try more expensive ones up to about £20 a bottle. Although this seems a lot, most wines covered in the Magazine 'DECANTER' are about £50+ . Some people have a lot more money than us!

The present organ is one of the finest in any parish church.

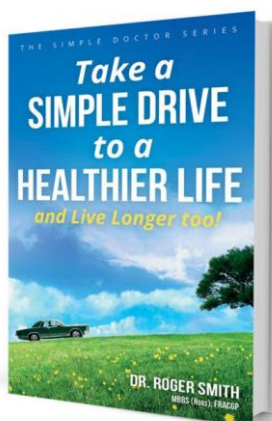

MK U3A - OPEN MEETINGS 2020

22 JANUARY – Traversa: A Solo Walk Across Africa – Fran Sandham

Serialised in the Sunday Times, this is the account of Fran Sandham's 3,000-mile solo walk coast to coast across Africa (from the Atlantic on Namibia's Skeleton Coast to the Indian Ocean at Zanzibar), the first time in history anyone has crossed Africa solo entirely on foot by this route – or at least solo apart from a disastrous donkey.

26 FEBRUARY – A sense of everyday life in ancient Rome – Eleanor Betts

Some of us will be familiar with Eleanor Betts, author, lecturer and BBC presenter of 'What did the Ancients do for us?' Today Eleanor will be our guide to an ancient Rome that many never hear about:

The roar of the crowd, the smell of cooked sausages, the taste of wine... What was it like to experience everyday life in ancient Rome? This talk will encourage us to imagine we are walking in the footsteps of Rome's urban populace. Open Meeting - IT Help Desk

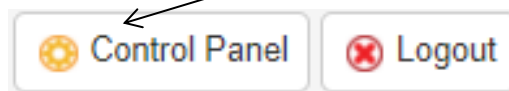
There is normally an opportunity both before and after the Open Meetings to seek assistance with IT problems and using the MK U3A website, including setting up your login and password and updating your personal profile.

When available it's offered before the meeting from 2:00pm and after the meeting until 4:15pm but please check the Open Meeting confirmation email to confirm it will be available on the day.

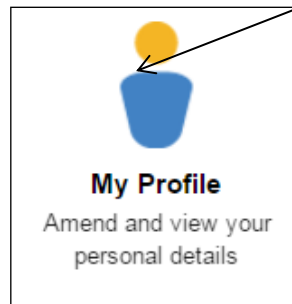
Free Wi-Fi is available at the venue.

1. Open the MK U3A website (mku3a.org)
2. Login to the site. (If you haven't set your login password yet please see the instructions on the LOGIN page.)
3. Once you are logged in 'click' on the Control Panel icon top right of screen

MK Chorale's next concert in November offers a programme of Italian music of the baroque era, with a special focus on women in music, under the title Hidden Italy.

Alongside the music, the Chorale is joined by members of The Play's The Thing theatre company, to present readings that offer insights into the position of women in culture and society in 17th and 18th century Italy, including a first-hand account of the women and girls who performed in the orphanages of Venice.

All but one of the five choral pieces have their origins in Venice. Monteverdi's *Beatus Vir* and *Cantate Domino* were written when he was Master of Music at St Mark's.

Vivaldi's *Magnificat* was written for and first performed by the female musicians of the Ospedale della Pietà, a Venetian orphanage where girls were taught to sing and play to the highest standards.

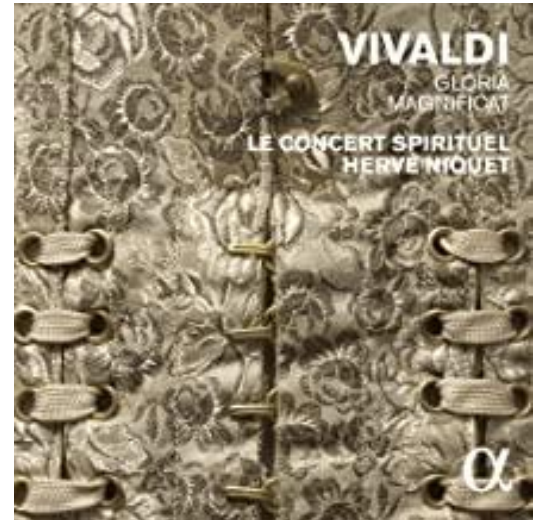
Venice was also home to Barbara Strozzi, whose *Silentio Nocivo* is an affecting song of uncertain love.

Our fifth piece, *Isabella Leonarda's Magnificat*, is from the pen of a nun in the convent of Sant'Orsola in Novara; she wrote about 200 pieces for her fellow nuns.

We are accompanied by members of the Adderbury Ensemble, who will perform trio sonatas by Archangelo Corelli.
