

Dear Members,

Autumn is here and we are still in the midst of the health crisis with no real end in sight and the number affected with the disease in our area rising slowly but surely. As I write the figure of 92 cases per 100,000 is shown when I search which is an extra 30 cases per 100,000 from this time last week. We are still below the average figure for England, but we are certainly not out of the woods!!

The council are keeping us well informed through their Covid-19 Champion scheme, this includes a weekly written update and a video presentation by Peter Marland, the council leader. Both are clear and concise.

The Trustees held their monthly meeting last Monday and with the government guidelines for Tier 1 clear the Trustees took the decision that MK U3A should remain closed apart from any Zoom meetings (or meetings using other platforms) and indoor and outdoor group meetings limited to 6 members from different households. There is no telling how long we will be in Tier 1 so we will try to keep you up to date with any changes.

We have had feedback from some members about the reduced level of activities that they were able to take part in the last six months. A further item on the agenda was a proposal to increase the membership 'year' for all members by 3 months from your next renewal date, that is 15 months membership instead of 12. This will of course mean that we will have to use some of our reserve funds for any shortfall in our finances. Diana, our treasurer, is providing costings for this proposal and working on our budget for the coming financial year. Our outgoings remain more of less the same with our commitment to The Third Age Trust, our office running costs and maintaining our website etc. We are also providing two free virtual Open Meetings each month which were not in the budget for this year. Amending the renewal system on our website to change the 12 month period to 15 months is quite a complex exercise as we run the membership renewals throughout the year on the month you initially joined and this change can only be achieved through our website developers. We will give you more information on this once it is in place.

The eagle-eyed among you may have spotted that the logo on our website has changed in line with the recommendation from the Third Age Trust. The wording 'University of the Third Age' has been removed and been replaced with the new banner 'Learn, Laugh, Live'. We will be working through all of documentation to make the change in the coming weeks. (If you cannot see the new banner you may have to clear your cache, you can Google how to do this if the process is unfamiliar to you).

The Zoom Open Meetings are still very popular and we would like to send out thanks to Lynne who makes sure there are a wide variety of topics and interesting speakers and Dave who ensures we can all see and hear the speaker. Our choir will be singing for us in December and TAP, the Third Age Players, are in the middle of rehearsing a programme to entertain us very soon. After the Open Meeting on 14th October we tried using 'Breakout Rooms' which is a feature within Zoom which allows groups to meet virtually and chat together. It all seemed to work well, and we will use this facility ongoing.

The Financial Times published a favourable article about Milton Keynes on 27th October which you can still access if you type 'Financial Times Milton Keynes'. Finally, we seem to have shed the idea that all we have is Concrete Cows and Roundabouts!!

Please keep safe and remember the mantra Hands, Face Space.

Covid-19 App

Do you know about the C-19 Symptom Tracker App which was started by Kings College London researchers, back in March, I believe, and has more than 4 million people logging in daily to report their symptoms (or none)? It is led by Professor Tim Spectre, head of the Department of Twin Research at St Thomas's Hospital, which is how I came to know about it. (My twin and I have been part of their cohort for more than 20 years.) They were the first group to recognise loss of taste and smell as a symptom of Covid.

An extract from their website:-

"By using this app you're helping and contributing to advance vital research on COVID-19. By combining your reports with software algorithms, we are able to predict who has the virus and so track COVID infections across the UK and now other countries. Your daily reporting is also being used to generate new scientific understanding of the very different symptoms the virus causes in different people. We are also studying the way that risks vary between individuals because of their own personal characteristics."

IT Carrying on Regardless

During these unusual and challenging times four IT groups from the outset of Covid19 have successfully continued with their sessions, from home, using video conferencing software. There are even some significant advantages, coffee breaks are far more flexible and you can dunk your favourite biscuits. No travelling, saving fuel, dress code more flexible, and join the session languishing in your favourite chair! Why didn't we do this before?

Each group runs their sessions using a mix of presentation software, screen sharing, and the lost art of talking. The sessions are generally pre-planned with specific topics many of which are requested by the members.

We are all enthusiastic groups of PC, Laptop and smartphone users with varied levels of experience. From those new to computing to those more experienced we all exchange knowledge, ideas, tips and personnel experiences, even between the four groups (via the group leaders) with a view to keeping up with the latest software, updates, security risks etc.

Each of the following four groups specialise in specific areas, Computer group in Microsoft based systems, MacOS in Apple PC and Laptop systems, and iPad in Apple iPad's and iPhones and there are some vacancies in each of the groups for users at any level. To become a member of one or more of the groups is a one-off Fee of £5.00 to cover the shared annual cost of the Video Conferencing Software (we are using Webex which is a more secure system than most). The £5.00 will last until either we are able to return to normal in a meeting room or to next October 1st 2021.

To join any of the four groups just go to the MKu3a website, select your interest group and where it says 'Group Leaders' click on the email address and send us your details and we will respond with joining instructions. As with all groups, your first session is a taster session which is free.

Computer Group This group session is at 10:15 am on the Second and Fourth Thursday of each month. This group has 4 vacancies

MacOS Group (New Group) This group session is at 09:15 to 10:15 on the First Friday of each month This group has 5 Vacancies

iPad group 2 This group session is at 10:30 on the first Friday of each month This group has 5 vacancies

iPad group 3 This group session is at 2:00pm on the first Monday of each month This group has 6 vacancies

Bridging the Gap - Life with Bridge in Lockdown

There is an ancient Chinese curse that, and I paraphrase, extols us to live in interesting times. And 2020 has certainly been interesting and challenging for us all. The lockdown has meant that we have not been able to come together to meet at local bridge clubs as we have all been so used to, so I am sure that we are all so grateful that we are able to play bridge online. Whilst the facility to both practice and to play bridge has been available for several years, the recent pandemic and associated lockdown has led to a

considerable rise in use of online bridge platforms. As we may be using virtual platforms more going forward, I thought I would share some of what I take part in which will give an indication of what is available. This is not a comprehensive review of everything that is available but a lay person's overview of the platforms that I have accessed to date.

The main online platform I have used is Bridge Base which although American, has players from all over the world. There are a wide variety of tournaments, many of which are completely free to take part in.

I, like several other county members play in the four main daily tournaments run on Bridge Base by the English Bridge Union (EBU) and there is also a faster game available should you wish and also a game for less experienced players. Master points are awarded for all games and the cost is now \$2 per session. To play, users need to set up a credit which can be done by credit card or pay pal with the exchange rate varying and is dependent on different providers. I am a member of the Acol club on Bridge Base and play in some of their tournaments which are free. There is also an opportunity to play teams on Tuesday evening which is enjoyable. I am involved in the organising of the teams matches

As well as actual games, there are now more and more online bridge advice tutorials that can be accessed, At the start of lockdown in March, I started watching Bernard Magee seminars which were originally free. A member's club has now been set up for which there is a monthly subscription of £13.99. This does, on the face of it, seem a little expensive but equates to just over £3 each week which is less than many players were paying for club sessions. From user statistics, it seems that many took advantage of the initial free broadcasts and there is still a weekly free seminar and the original free weekly seminars are available on You Tube. For the subscription member's club there are about 650 members of all skill levels and many arrange to play together. There are also forums within the club where members can ask Julian Pottage specific bridge questions and David Stevenson questions on laws and ethics. In addition, every fortnight there is a seminar with eight set hands and these are available to play at different times on Bridge Base and these can also be downloaded for users to play individually on the site or as I do, I download them to play at home on my computer with Q Plus Bridge software. There is a video explanation available for each hand. In addition to these I:

• follow Andrew Robson's daily bridge podcasts. Each cast is around five or six minutes long, they usually contain useful information. There is a monthly subscription for the podcasts and currently the charge is £9.59 per month.

 am a member of Abbey Smith's Bridge Club based at Drayton Parslow, running three virtual weekly bridge sessions and which has a team in the Wessex League. Bedford Bridge Association's virtual teams league is now under way with six teams involved.

An exciting new development is RealBridge which to me, is as close to actual face to face bridge as we are likely to get for some considerable time. The difference to other sites is that players have video and audio that means users can see and speak to their partner and opponents, and there is a virtual bidding box to make bids. The other difference to Bridge Base is that as in normal bridge, the partner of the bidder alerts or announces any bids which require it. The EBU ran their Autumn Congress on the site. I understand that several bridge clubs including Milton Keynes are taking advantage of it and are starting to run sessions on it. Given this, I imagine that its popularity will grow and more opportunities to take part in virtual sessions will be available.

Many other bridge sites are available such as FunBridge and Bridge Club Live. I personally have no experience of these platforms but as far as I am aware, they function in a similar way to BBO.

As can be seen there are plenty of opportunities to take part in bridge activities. I would urge those who have not yet done so to consider some of the options. Whilst the thought of accessing bridge online might appear daunting, much of it is intuitive and there are often other users available to help if needed. The likelihood of normal club session restarting before later next year is perhaps unlikely so this might be the way in which as a bridge community we can continue to come together to play. None of us knows how long restrictions will remain in place and then perhaps even when lifted, several players may be uncertain about returning to clubs. Given this, consideration may have to be given for a mixed approach where clubs run sessions which also include players online. This would enable those who are, for various reasons, not physically at the club.

So, let's hope we all stay safe and well and may we soon be living in less interesting times.
