A brief description of the outings is listed below, please ensure that you see full details given in the information flyer including the booking form so you are fully aware of any mobility, access or safety issues.

Once we have paid for the coach and venue (just after the booking closing date) we are sorry but we are unable to offer a refund, unless a replacement booking is made for the excursion in question.

23 June Blenheim Palace and Flower Show Ref:OGO3

"A lovely day out, enjoyed by everyone on the trip, visits inside the Palace where we saw the beautiful dresses of Royal Weddings (albeit replicas made for the Crown Series) the state rooms with the collections of portraits, tapestries and furniture followed by a stroll in the formal gardens. Then onto the Flower Show grounds where we saw the Gold medal display winners and many a plant was purchased to take home."

27 July Arundel Castle Ref:OGO4

"The weather was kind to us, although dull and overcast it stayed dry most of the day. The International Jousting festival was enjoyed by The Falconer with his trainee 13 year old son showed us an Owl, all. Kestel and Harris Hawk and allowed them to fly around the arena and over our heads, demonstrating their skills of speed and hovering above prey. This was followed by the Kids Battle, with children armed with replica swords, shields and helmets, first taking on their parents in battle and then two armies of Lancastrians and Yorkists doing battle.....the kids loved it, especially fighting their parents. A fire eater followed, who again the kids lapped up, screaming and shouting as he breathed and swallowed fire. The Jousting challengers came from across the world to compete, the farthest away being from Australia. Competitors rode towards each other, lances at the ready. As they passed each other they attempted to prove their dexterity by hitting their opponent on their plate armour aiming to score points with most scored for hitting the shield. They also have to prove their deftness with a sword and exhibit their power by striking a spinning quintain as part of the Skill at Arms competition. Scores are given to the competitor each day, then finalised at the end of the week to decide the winner. Around the castle grounds there were many other activities to participate in, axe throwing, warrior training and archery. There were also the gardens and the house to enjoy as one of the oldest castles in England." It was to coin a phrase 'A Grand Day Out'.

24 August Hampton Court Palace Ref: OG05

Pick up Point: MK Coachway, Coachway Road, MK16 OAA at 8.00am Company: Bills Coaches

Cost: £40 includes entrance to Palace, gardens and a 1½ hour guided tour to introduce the main features of this wonderful palace.

Hampton Court – managed by Historic Palaces, an independent charity, has over 500 years of history to discover. The home of Henry VIII, his wives and children, the palace is the greatest and most authentic Tudor experience in the world.

There are various options offering refreshments. The Tiltyard café provides a selection of hot and cold food offerings. The Magic Garden Kiosk serves drinks and ice cream.

Accessibility: While they make Hampton Court Palace accessible to all visitors, this historic building has many uneven surfaces and difficult staircases. They recommend that wheelchair users bring their own wheelchairs for comfort and ease.

28 September Paul McCartney Photographs: 'Eye of the Storms' National Portrait Gallery(NPG)

Pick Up Point: MK Coachway Coachway Road MK16 OAA at 9.00am Company Bill's Coaches

Cost: £33 Entry into the exhibition at 2.00pm, plus free time to explore the up to £43million pound refurbishment of the NPG with the revised hanging from over 2million photos and paintings. Includes coach cost and drivers tip. There have been many articles in the papers regarding this re-opening made by the Princess of Wales, the refurbishment looks fascinating with much more to see as well as the Eyes of the Storm exhibition.

These photographs have not been seen since 1964, They are photos the singer took of his friends and bandmates and give a Beatle's-eye view of the mania around the band in 1964. These extraordinary behind the scenes moments capture four young men on the brink of immortality.

40 tickets have been booked for the exhibition on a first come first served basis.

As this booking leaves 12 spaces available on the coach we are also offering the chance for those who want to visit the refurbished NPG, which is free of charge to enter, at a cost of £14 including coach costs and drivers tip.

All meals and refreshments for both options are at own cost.





<u>A Literature Class in Milton Keynes – September to December</u> <u>2023 – Joe Clinch</u>

This class should appeal to those who are keen on discussing good literature with a highly experienced tutor and a more structured format than is usually possible in book groups. The tutor, **Karen Hewitt**, taught regularly for Oxford University Department for Continuing Education in Milton Keynes, but a change of policy by OUDCE and the WEA has meant that she is now running these classes in Milton Keynes independently with a continuing group of about a dozen class members.

The class theme for the Autumn Term is 'Aspects of Love' when the following works will be studied:

- First Love and Other Stories by Turgenev, Oxford University Press
- Villette by Charlotte Bronte
- Complete Novellas of D.H. Lawrence, Blackthorn Press
- Death in Venice and Other Stories by Thomas Mann translated by David Luke, Vintage
- Either The Chatto Book of Love Poetry edited by John Fuller or the New Penguin Book of Love Poetry edited by John Stallworthy (to be decided)

An essay chosen from a wide list of topics is an essential part of the class.

Time and Place The class will be held on Mondays from 10.00 to 12 noon **starting on 25th September 2023.** It will last for 11 weeks with a half term booked provisionally for 24th October. The class will be held in the comfortable **Methodist Church Hall in Stony Stratford**.

Fee The fee for the 11-week class will be £160 to cover paying the tutor, travel expenses, hire of hall and insurance. Potential new members are very welcome to come along to the first meeting to sample the class before they commit themselves to paying the fee.
