25th June - Operation Pied Piper - World War II Evacuation of Children — Pat Fawcett

On the 3 September 1939, Britain and France declared war on Nazi Germany. Two days' earlier, on 1 September, the government had initiated Operation Pied Piper, which would see the evacuation of over 1.5 million people from urban 'target' areas, of whom 800,000 were children. Pat Fawcett joins us to talk about her personal experience of evacuation as a child in WWII.

We currently have spaces for new members and would love to see you. Come along and enjoy learning the ancient and fascinating game of backgammon.



Painters Progress

We recently had a speaker visit our group Painters Progress <u>Mark Warner</u> Mark spends about 40 minutes en plein air sketching a street scene using water soluble pencils. Composition is all important. Staring with rudimentary shapes, one block for the sky, another for the road, blocks for the buildings. Onto these blocks he sketches the lines of perspective converging at the vanishing point. Gradually suggestions of detail are added.

Sketching is about seeing. As he adds suggestions of details like windows and architectural embellishment's he references how everything lines up across the picture. He then adds some water to blend the shading When the sketch is dry, he then returns to reinstate the details.

Don't Feed the Phish

The Internet has transformed our lives, we cannot take advantage of its benefits, without being aware of its disadvantages and pitfalls.

Below is an explanation of one of those pitfalls that you need to be aware of.

It is called Phishing. Similar to the popular pastime "fishing" it involves reeling in unsuspecting victims with promises that are unlikely to materialise to their advantage.

The main weapon used by the fraudsters is an unsolicited email, The emails seek to persuade the receiver to click on a link (usually blue highlighted text) and to encourage them to give up passwords or other sensitive data.

It is often the case that fraudulent email addresses, supposedly being sent by reputable companies, are often a string of random characters - 1845956@hotmail.com - which would be unlikely to be used by professional organisations.

The emails themselves are often in poor quality English, with little or no punctuation. Alternatively, it may appear to come from someone you know. encouraging you to purchase of gift cards (Amazon is a favourite). Replying to the email proves to the fraudster that your email address is valid and guarantees that it will be sold on to other fraudsters.

Increasingly, approaches are being made by SMS text or by voice phone call (known as smashing and vishing). The call may purport to come from your bank or other trusted organisation. It will suggest that an account has been compromised or hacked and to "safeguard" the monies held, the funds should be transferred to a separate account that the fraudsters have kindly set up for the purpose. Regardless of the method used to reel in the victim, the approach taken to defeat the fraudsters is always to:

- Give yourself time to think. Don't allow the email/text/phone call to panic you into acting hastily.
- Anything that says that you must act urgently must be treated with suspicion.
- Is there any alternative way to check to see if the approach is genuine? Can you telephone (on a number that you know or can be verified independently)?
- If (by chance) the approach is genuine, the caller/sender will not be offended if you elect to check that they are who they say they are.

At least 80% of the world's email traffic is spam/fraudulent. As we rely more on the internet it is more than likely that you will receive phishing scam approaches. Please think carefully about how you respond to them. Should you need advice, the MKu3a IT team are available to help.

A Tale of Honeybees "Moving In".

Swarm season for honeybees started early this year due to the favourable spring weather. But it's still going on and I wanted to share an issue a local beekeeper highlighted to me when he collected swarms from Milton Keynes estates during May.

He is often called to local swarms by someone using the BBKA swarm collector map. This is useful for members of the public to find the nearest beekeeper to the swarm and often means a much faster response.

This is an example for Milton Keynes:



In the first instance a swarm had entered a vacant property through the extractor fan outlet which didn't have an external cover on it. He found them clustered in the kitchen and had to isolate them there despite there being no internal doors. He

managed to do that but also secured a

cover over the outlet pipework to prevent any re-entry.



In the second case the swarm he was called to had settled on the house wall. As he cleared the bees, he noticed a hole in the wall behind the cluster. The householder had recently had his bathroom refurbished and the new toilet no longer needed an overflow pipe. His plumber had removed the redundant pipe but the small hole through to the external wall remained. The bees had gone in and up the inside of

the cavity to settle inside the house wall. That meant it was no longer a job the beekeeper could do but needed the services of a specialist bee removal contractor, please do check your property to make sure there are no external holes that a swarm of bees could come in through.
