You will have seen that MKu3a is embracing technology with the ongoing implementation of those small square readers, ready to take any group payments from your bank cards. This rollout has reduced our bank transactions, helped GCs submit their monthly returns and helped Diana, our treasurer, to easily agree group payments. In the first week of September over £2,500 was paid using this method. Fantastic and thank you to all who have paid their group payments by this method.

Short Breaks and Holidays

Although these trips are not organised by MKu3a, Chris Behrendt from the Outings team liaises with a travel company to bring these short breaks to our members. Details of the last trip are detailed below:

MKU3A – KYNREN AN EPIC TALE OF ENGLAND

THURSDAY 11th – MONDAY 15th SEPTEMBER 2025

THURSDAY 11th - Milton Keynes/Wentworth Woodhouse/Washington 45 people set out on this journey.

Wentworth Woodhouse, a hidden treasure with some remarkable stories. With the longest façade of any stately home in the UK, grand state rooms and 50 acres of gardens, with guided tours by knowledgeable volunteer guides we learnt so much about the family and the history of the house.

FRIDAY 12th - Beamish Open Air Museum Today we enjoyed a full day at the award-winning Beamish Open Air Museum which brings the history of Northeast England to life at the turn of the century and now including a 1950's village and shops where all that could be heard was 'we had one of them' and a fish and chip shop serving great fish and chips.. Attractions include Pockerley Old Hall, the Pit Village and Colliery, Rowley Station, a typical 1940s farm, the Welfare Hall, Rowley Station, and the town itself where you can take a tram ride and visit the shops

SATURDAY 13th - Auckland Project & Kynren Spectacular with preshow dinner

Depart for **Bishop Auckland**, to discover the remarkable achievements of the Auckland Project and its founder Jonathan Rutter, the entrepreneur who had a vision to bring life back to this former mining town. All-inclusive ticket allows entry to **Auckland Castle**, former seat of the powerful Prince Bishops, where a guided tour includes the famous Zurburan paintings of 'Jacob and his Twelve Sons' in the Long Dining Room. Other attractions include the Mining Museum, the Spanish Gallery, the Faith Museum and the Auckland Tower.

We then re-joined coach to transfer to Kynren and the Eleven Arches Restaurant for the pre-show meal.

The first year that Kynren has provided a 3-course dinner with a glass of wine prior to the show and enjoyed by all.

Kynren – how do you explain the experience, 'The history of England in an hour and a half' is my interpretation. The whole performance by over a 1000 volunteers. Incredible and if you get the opportunity to visit well worth it with more experiences opening during the day from 2026.

SUNDAY 14th - Cragside (National Trust)

The journey to Cragside included a short stop at the Angel of the North for photo opportunities. **Cragside**, Britain's original 'smart home', one of the first to have electricity powered by hydroelectricity set in the midst of a grand fantasy garden that sits on a rocky outcrop with grounds made up of huge rhododendrons, towering conifers, tumbling water and open lakes.

MONDAY 15th - Washington/Malton/Milton Keynes

The weather that had been kind to us, took a change with wind and rain and although we spent time at Eden Camp Modern History Museum which recounts the social and military history of World War II in a series of exhibition huts, all within the grounds of an original Prisoner of War Camp unfortunately spoilt by the rain, an interesting and enlightening experience. The intention was to take lunch and visit the shops in Malton, known was the Foodie Capital of the North. Pouring with rain and some shops shut, consensus – no stop.

<u>Items Which May Be of Interest</u> Friends of Bletchley Station (FOBS)



"Lovely flowers! Thank you for what you are doing!", "You are doing a great job, thanks!". Volunteers tending the planters filled with flowers or affixing posters in Bletchley station regularly receive such compliments from passers-by, travellers and railway staff alike. Faced with a functional but mundane 1960s station, FOBS has a clear aim: "Working with London Northwestern Railway to ensure Bletchley Station offers a informative green, and welcoming gateway to Bletchley

and its surrounds."

For the past three years, the small band of volunteers has worked tirelessly to make the station a more cheerful and convivial place. However, to keep up the good work and build on its success, the group needs a few more people to join in its activities. Many of the current volunteers help out with gardening, but others are involved in tasks

such as liaising with our railway hosts, fundraising, communicating with members of the local community, running our social media or promoting local history – there is something for everyone. Railway enthusiasts have the added bonus of being able to keep an eye out for trains of interest as they carry out their gardening duties!



FOBS inherited a small garden near the main station building and some planters. We soon installed more planters around the station and collaborated with the Bee-Friendly Society which provided two large containers, now filled with lavender and other plants attractive to pollinating insects. The group is keen to involve the community in all its activities. Volunteers from railway companies on their Volunteering Day as well as children from a local school and from a Scouts group on occasion help with gardening. FOBS cooperates with MK College Group, whose students will be working on the website; there is also a Facebook page.

FOBS has adorned the station with artworks: a specially commissioned mural celebrating Bletchley's heritage, photographs of Marston Vale destinations on the Bedford train platform, placards illustrating local history (with material from the Milton Keynes Living Archive), and

posters displaying regularly updated artwork from schools and a community art group.

FOBS is a part of the community rail movement which comprises 75 Community Rail Partnerships (CRPs) and 1300 volunteer groups that help communities get the most from their railway. Marston Vale CRP covering the Bletchley – Bedford line hosts FOBS – for more information contact marstonvalecommunityrail.org.uk.



Since then, Verdi's Requiem has become one of the staples of the repertoire for choral societies. The work is style theatrical in with intensely dramatic sections powerful choruses and vivid depictions of the Day of Wrath ('Dies Irae', which is often heard on Classic FM) and passages of great tenderness and simplicity such as the joyful praise resounds in the 'Sanctus'.
