Third Age Players Getting 'in the mood' for the 1940s

Those of you who went along to enjoy Newport Pagnell's recent 1940s celebration may have caught sight of Third Age Players doing their research. Unlike our play, the theme was war-time, putting the costume emphasis on uniforms of every service. The authentic men's hair fashion of the time would have been *short back and sides* but today's men it seemed were unprepared to sacrifice their locks. Those with a shiny pate balanced their lack on top with magnificently fecund moustaches. Ladies hairstyles, however, were true to the period in being severe and practical to accommodate the uniform cap which, as those of you who were in the services will remember, was expected to be worn at a regulation and totally unattractive angle!

In our forthcoming play, "When the Lights go on Again" our actors, who are shown in retirement in the 1940s, would also have had to contend with the approval, or otherwise, of their peers. Their choice of fashion in dress, makeup and hair style would have been judged according to the suitability of the style for their AGE. Coloured hair, usually blond to slavishly follow favourite film stars, was considered not so much a fashion statement as an unflattering reflection on the wearer's morality.

How lucky we are to be of retirement age today, knowing that we can wear whatever we like, culottes, four inch heels, green toenails, cerise streaks, purple eye shadow or plenty of bling. Our sense of style may be called into question but our character is unlikely to be assassinated. The women in our play, you will be relieved to know, will be following the conventional styles of the era.

when the goal was respectability

When you enter the Chrysalis Theatre in September we will be asking you, our audience, to leave your present-day reality in the lobby, and at Curtain-Up to involve yourselves in a 1940s world where respectability was of vital importance. The media, in the form of the local papers, were just as intrusive then as they are today and their readers, satiated with wartime news, hung on every word of juicy gossip and were only too ready to enjoy, before condemning, lapses of any kind.

As the play progresses, the ill-assorted group gradually develop trust in each other until eventually, the dam breaks and years of hurt, anger and frustration flood out with secrets that have long held them captive. To avoid losing their new-found peace and tranquillity, they resolve that they will go to any lengths to protect themselves from publicity; their desperation leading them to follow through on an outrageous suggestion made by ...the Reverend!

birthday? Living Archive MK is seeking 50 people to be an integral part of *MK50 – The People's Story!* We want to hear about your memories to help us gather, share and celebrate a wide range of stories from people who have lived or worked in or around Milton Keynes over the last 50 years.

We are looking to select 50 people to interview on camera and create a short, 2-3 minute film of each of the 50 selected memories. The collection of digital stories will form part of a major, multi-media exhibition in 2018 uncovering the hidden histories and mapping the peoples' story of Milton Keynes.
