Annual General Meeting

I'm looking forward to the AGM in March – notice of this is well advertised in this esteemed journal and elsewhere. We had about 120 in attendance last year – I would very much like to see a few more to come and keep a beady eye on your administration team. Actions have been taken to accommodate any overflow at the Oak Tree Centre.

There will be a lot of new faces on the administration team next year. We are very grateful to those stepping aside as they have built a solid base, with reduced costs, for MK U3A to progress into the future. We do need some fresh faces with new ideas for MK U3A study and projects, but any newcomers will benefit from the very hard work put in over the last two years to bring forth a simple, effective administrative system and a strong financial position.

Our auditor has examined our 2016 accounts and, after some in-depth analysis, has issued our certificate. He has added a note in his report which I copy in here for your interest and without further comment from me.

I was pleased to learn about the new management system and in particular the accounting package with the ability of allowing GL's to enter their groups information both financial and administrative. This means that all GL's will or should provide their information in a uniform manner, which will no doubt make the treasurers role less stressful. It is understood some will be able to adopt the online format easily but others will need varying degrees of support but the end result will be a positive one for all concerned. Another aspect which is recommended is that GL's should be reminded of the policy to cover all operating costs again some do but there are some that have either no knowledge of the policy or having issues with its interpretation and again support to encourage good practice should be given.

Those attending the AGM can look forward to another excellent local keynote speaker. In the year of MK50 it is right that we celebrate with one of our city fathers, Peter Waterman of the Milton Keynes Development Corporation. He moved to Milton Keynes in 1968 when he was appointed as a planning officer for the Church of England, and also secretary of the Bishop of Oxford's Ecumenical Committee. He went on to serve as Director of Social Development, a unique role in civic administration. How does he see the future planning of Milton Keynes?

The Role of Groups Coordinator (or even Coordinators!)

Within the changes in the trustees, we still have a glaring vacancy for 2017. If any one person, or two or more

The role ensures the smooth running of all Groups within MK U3A on behalf of the Committee and Members. It also works closely with any proposer of a New Group to enable its successful establishment. Broadly, the task entails:

- being an MK U3A Trustee reporting to the monthly management meeting. (MK U3A is a charity, so Trustee is just the formal title of a committee member);
- ensuring all groups work within guidelines of the Third Age Trust and of MK U3A;
- arranging periodic meetings (as needed, but maybe bi-annually) with all Group Leaders (or representatives) and the Committee;
- working with the Datum Manager, ensuring web site and hard copy information on groups is up-to-date and informative;
- ensuring that contractual arrangements are in place for external paid tutors;
- working with all groups on administrative needs such as venue hire, membership lists for groups, finance returns and group waiting list. (all this is normally managed by Group Leaders, but support is needed at times of change):
- providing support to anyone who offers to lead a new group, exploring how the group could work, arranging first meetings and supporting any group through its inception period;
- encouraging groups and members to take advantage of Third Age Trust services.

New members Induction Sessions – we now run monthly meetings for new members aimed at outlining the background to the U3A movement, explaining how to get the best out of your membership with MKU3A, and showing you how to use the website and join groups.

Biology and more - the only Science Group in MK U3A

From a core interest in cell biology; the forms, functions and evolution of all living things; and the latest advances in medicine and more, this Group spreads its coverage into many related sciences.

Our first meeting of 2017 saw us welcome back a lapsed member as well as welcoming newcomers, though we still have room for a few more.

A very informative introduction from Liz, the group Leader, on the role of mitochondria in heredity and inheritance, stimulated a wide-ranging discussion with relevant contributions and experience from all those present. The Group went on to draw up a Programme for the next few months and was surprised to note how absorbing the morning had been.

On February 5th, the meeting heard an introduction from Peter on the administration of anti-cancer drugs. Despite the high public profile, treatments for cancer's many forms fall into few categories. Chemotherapy consists of courses of poisons, with a respite for healthy cells to recover while cancer cells rebound more slowly. Radiation is deadly but depends on an ability to target clusters of rogue cells very precisely, which is not always possible. In recent years some monoclonal antibodies have been designed to home in on receptors on the rogue cells and destroy them. But cancer cells have mechanisms to adapt and resist whatever strategies are used to attack them. A promising approach is to use nanoparticles with poisons piggybacked on them to gain entry to rogue cells.

The March meeting will be on Thursday 2nd March at Graham's home in Furzton. April 6th will be at Peter's in Woburn Sands. If you are unfamiliarwith either venue, please e-mail or ring the Leader as above. We would be delighted to receive visitors. Questions are welcomed and no speciality needed, just an interest in any science. What we do not know, we research.

TAP in Celebrations at MK Drama Festival

As Milton Keynes celebrates its 50th anniversary, the Third-Age Players are celebrating their twentieth. To mark both events, TAP chose to present a gentle reflection of the New City by Pip Parry, its founder. Published in

2003 in Pip's collection *Hidden Treasures*, a slightly updated version was abridged by the Publishers to meet the time slot for the Festival Senior Group Drama category.

Written with a gentle nod towards Dylan Thomas's *Under Milk Wood*, the sketch depicts a multitude of facets of, and characters in a typical new town, with the title *Under Brickhill Wood*. The Players were in contention with two other Groups, in their case older teenagers, while the session also included a solo entry from a slightly younger group.

The cup was won by a Group from Stagecoach, scoring a single mark more than the Third-Age Players. The Adjudicator praised TAP's stylish opening which played to the entire room, observing that the team, especially Jean Thomas in the major rôle of the Narrator, had given a master class in how to act up and project out to an audience, however sparse. She praised individual actors in all four of the conversation pieces. More use, she said, could have been made of the forestage, while she would have liked Heather Harris's exposure as the flirtatious housewife to be even more bold than it was – a stricture some might consider ill-advised in the case of elderly amateur actors!

The Stagecoach Group was complimented on their teamwork and sense of character, while all the youth teams needed to work on greater volume. There seemed to be a pervasive theme this year of using drama among teenagers to awaken consciousness of social problems among the actors. While this is educationally laudable, our members in the audience found this limited the communication between actors and audience that has traditionally been expected in theatregoing.

Third-Age Players wish to thank those who came along to support, whether from retired or associate members of TAP or from the wider MK U3A. Among them were Pip Parry's widow Phyllis, and his daughter Gill. The Company now returns with vigour to working on its casting for an Autumn production, so watch this space! KELMSCOTT, Summer home of William Morris



Kelmscott Manor is a limestone manor house in the Cotswold village of Kelmscott, near Lechlade. It dates from around 1570, with a late 17th-century wing, and is a Grade I listed building. The house - perhaps the most evocative of all the houses associated with Morris - contains an outstanding collection of the possessions and works of Morris, his family and his Arts & Crafts associates, including furniture, original textiles, pictures, carpets, ceramics and metalwork.

The study day will take the form of lectures and a guided tour of house, garden and the village.

The speaker will be Dr. Kathy Haslam, curator and specialist in Morris and the Arts & Crafts Movement. She's held curatorial posts at the V&A, Tullie House Museum in Cardiff as well as the Geffrye Museum in London. These were followed by 5 years as curator at Blackwell Arts & Crafts House in Cumbria after which she took up her post at Kelmscott.

My Brother. June Sinclair

The smell of wood smoke takes me instantly to Cornwall, sunshine, wild flowers growing by the side of a country lane, three years old and running through the greenery up a small hill and down the other side by myself, I am the last person left who saw and will remember Brian.

Brian Michael Atkin born the 23rd August 1940 in Dagenham, died 27th December 1940 in the Miners Hospital, Redruth cause of death Broncho Pneumonia, evacuated to escape the bombing only to succumb to the cold and damp of a Cornish winter, no photographs, buried in an unmarked grave never visited, the only other record of his brief life possibly an entry in an old church register.

My mother and I returned to Dagenham with my grandparents. If the sirens sounded we sheltered under the kitchen table, all I had left of my baby brother was the image of the ambulance doors closing as he was taken to the hospital, a yellow hair brush and a celluloid teddy bear. Rita Ivy arrived on 30th June1942, Carol Patricia 3rd September 1945. The noise of the siren, bombs exploding, the sight of a pile of rubble and a large smouldering space where the day before had been a family home became normal.

One year we moved home and school four times and ended up at Barkingside, the Banardo's children had been evacuated and their homes became temporary housing, a lot more space than we were used to and the grounds provided a safe green play area which reminded me of the countryside and we survived.

At school I discovered the joy of reading, books were a refuge, the library a treasure house. Enid Blyton has had a lot of criticism but during troubled times many children have been grateful for the escape she provided. My daughters in turn all went through their Enid Blyton stage.

For many years, I envied friends with younger brothers, how could they not appreciate how blessed they were? They of course thought me completely mad, at best a brother of any age was a mild irritation to be ignored.

Well before I became interested in the opposite sex I had decided that I would marry and have children, boys, no girls, and for some reason that four would be a good number to complete a family.

Eventually I had four children, three were daughters, the family now includes grandchildren and great grandchildren who will remember me with a mixture of affection and irritation as I become increasingly deaf, forgetful and cantankerous.

But I remember Brian, the gap his death left in my life and the influence it had on my decisions, he lived, was loved, remembered and missed, my brother.
